PRISON DIETAR1ES. The new scale of diet suggested for prisoners under short sentences of imprisonment has not been very long under consideration. The authorities have settled the point without hesitation or delay, and addressed communications to the Local Inspectors of Prisons, whose duties it will be to gauge the gaol-pots and look to the consistency and quantity of the Revalenta Arabica on which prisoners will hereafter grow plump and healthy. The following has been addressed from the "Prison's-

"Prisons Office, Dublin Castle, Sept. 14, 1850. "SIR-I am directed to inform you, in reply to your communication of the 10th inst., that all classes are to be included whose term of imprisonment shall not exceed one calendar month. The Inspector-General takes this opportunity of informing you, that the oatmeal gruel, &c., may be made as mild as possible, so as to reduce the dietary to an equality with, if not below, that in use in the workhouse.

"The Local Inspector, City Gaol, Cork." In our last observations on this subject we illustrated one branch of the argument by reference to prisoners confined for one calendar month, and, singular enough, we find that exact limitation adopted in the document from the Prison's-office. The order of the Queen's Bench judges specifies no particular class. It merely suggested that all persons confined for short periods should be placed on the workhouse dietary, leaving the prison authorities to fix the term within which the offenders evils which they entailed. The prison authorities, whether with or without the sanction of the judges we know not, have defined the class or classes subject to the new regimen-namely, all whose term does not exceed one calendar month.

The indiscriminate application of the order to all

persons under short sentences is unwarranted by both the letter and the spirit of the judicial suggestion. The object of the judges' rule was the prevention of petty larcenies for the purpose of ensuring the regularity and sufficiency of a gaol workhouse.
